This popular song among villagerscan be found on broadsides and was also collected by Greig and Hammond (1) Mr Broomfield's text is rather shorter than the others mentioned and Vaughan Williams has a number of question marks in his manuscript. He also noted that it was sung to the same tune as Banks of Sweet Dundee.

Young Henry being a highland lod courting to me came Courting pretty Carry as you shall hear the same He says put on your other gown and with me run away I've gone up to London a short time to stay

I had not been in London more than half a year Before young Henry proved me away? He says I'm going to sea and friends so on you frown? So back away without delay to Edinburgh Town
